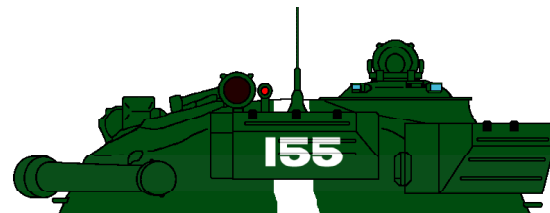
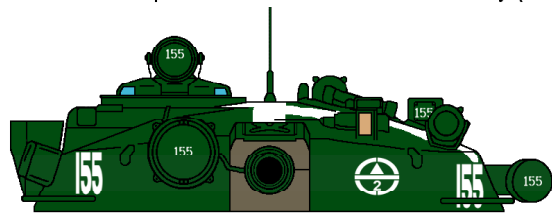

T-72 of the Group of Soviet Forces in East Germany (GSFG) as seen on a railway siding in the mid-1980s

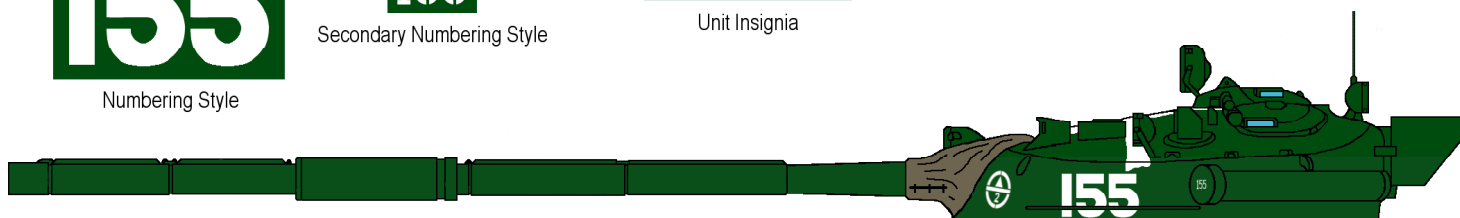

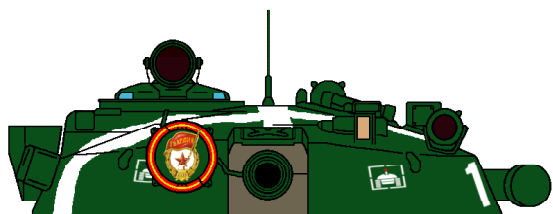

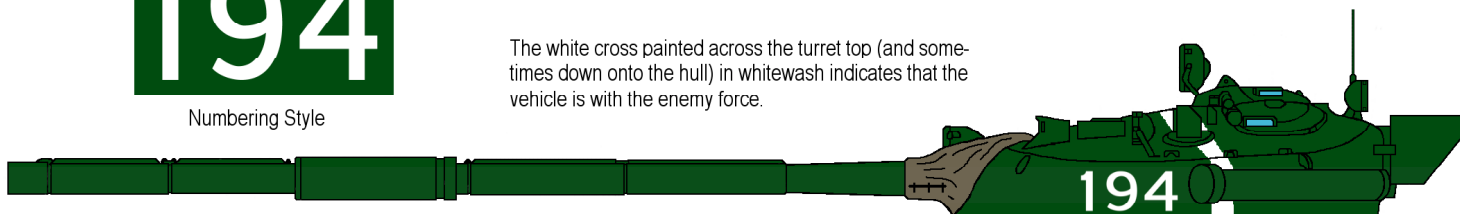


Guards Badge: originally given to units for distinguished service in battle, later for that and service in training or political orientation.

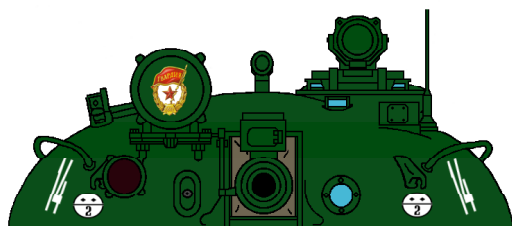


Numbering Style

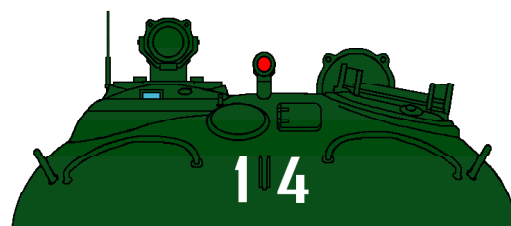
The white cross painted across the turret top (and sometimes down onto the hull) in whitewash indicates that the vehicle is with the enemy force.

Unit Insignia



This vehicle mounts an add-on laser rangefinder above the gun.

The other T-62s seen with this one had the turret number painted out or covered with a tarpaulin.
